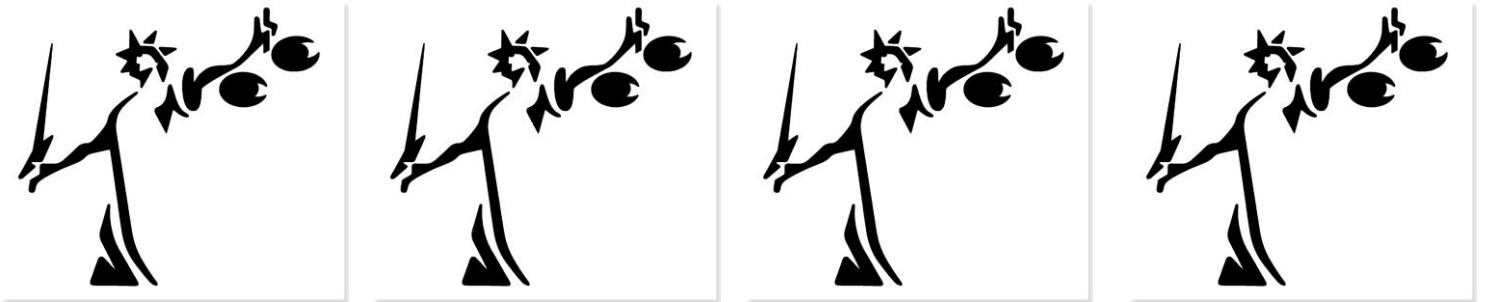


UCL-HKU Conference on Judicial Review in a Changing Society
